

New York's Move Over Law and safe driving tips:

- An emergency vehicle is any vehicle that displays red and/or white emergency lights.
- A hazard vehicle is any vehicle that displays amber warning lights.
- Drivers <u>MUST</u> use due care when approaching an emergency vehicle or hazard vehicle.
- On all roads, drivers <u>MUST</u> reduce speed for emergency vehicles and hazard vehicles.
- Unless traffic or other hazards exist to prevent doing so safely, on parkways, interstates and other controlled access highways, drivers MUST move from the lane immediately adjacent to the emergency or hazard vehicle.
- While driving, scan the road ahead for as far as you can see to detect hazards or other situations the require driver's action.
- As soon as you see an emergency vehicle, a
 hazard vehicle or any other hazardous situation,
 check traffic around you and MOVE OVER into the
 other lane as soon as it is safe.
- If too much traffic prohibits you from moving over or you are on a single lane road, SLOW DOWN to a safe speed that allows you to pass by the situation safely.
- The Move Over Law applies to both sides of the roadway, not just the shoulder on the right.
